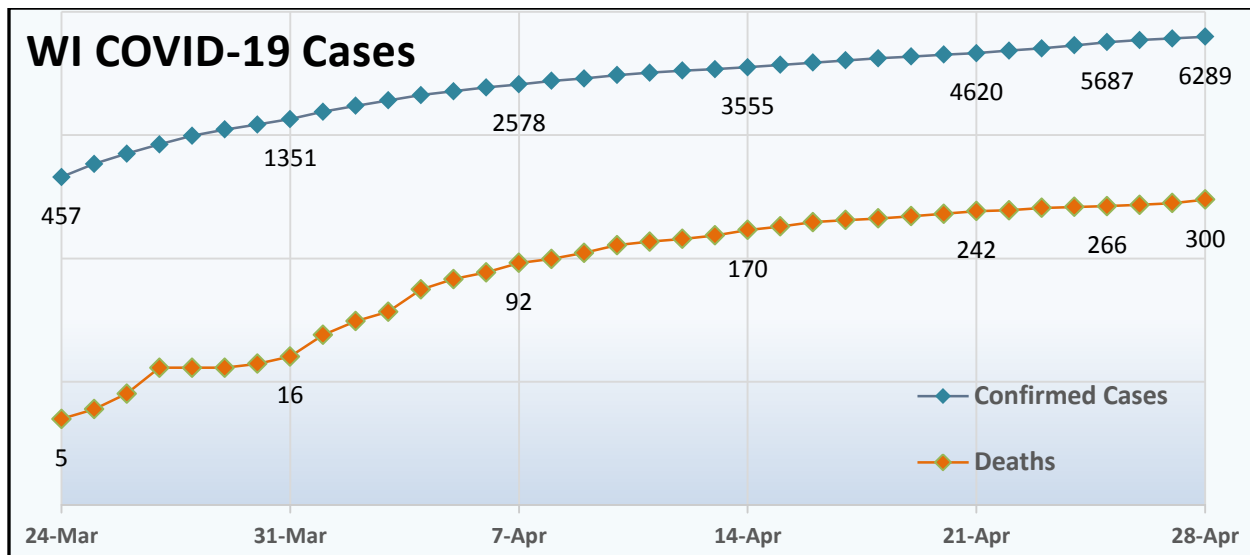

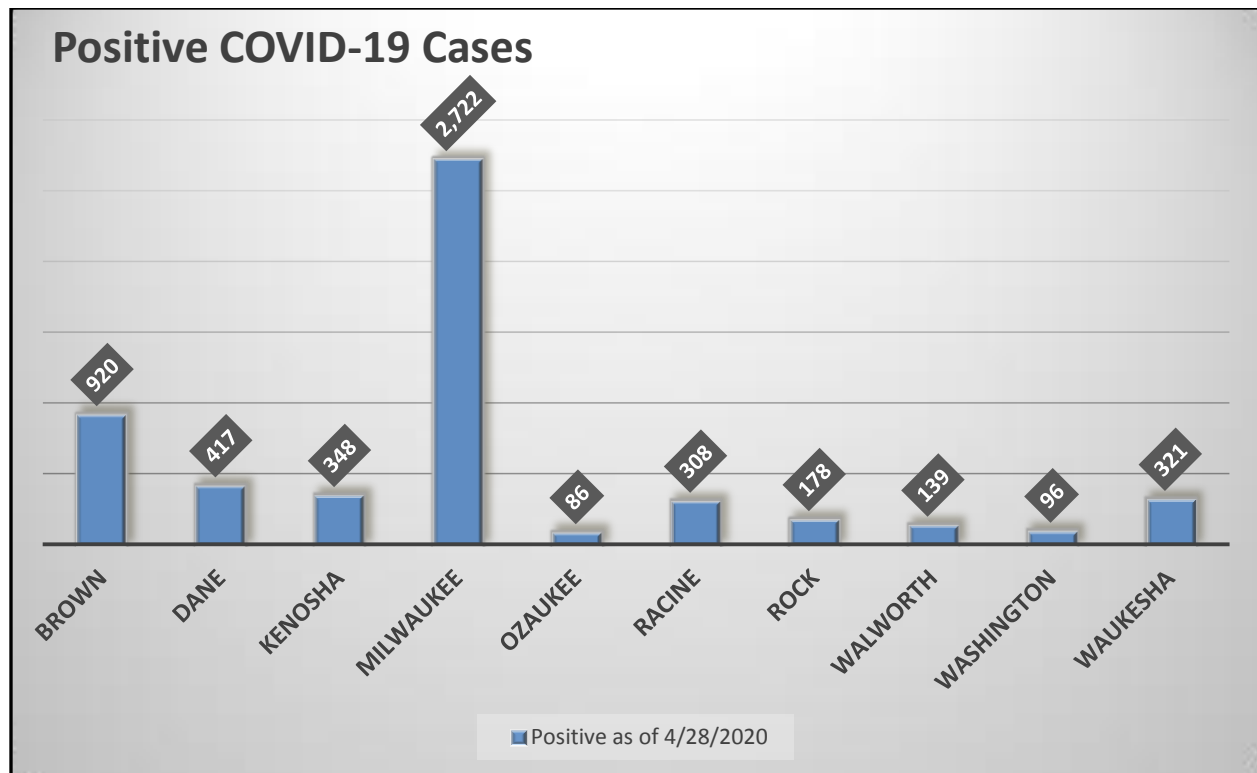

(U) Highlights

- (U) Since 25 March, [133 people have been arrested](#) by the Milwaukee Police for violating the safer-at-home order. **[TMJ4]**
- (U) [Froedtert and the Medical College of Wisconsin](#) treated a ventilated COVID-19 patient with extracorporeal membrane oxygenation and convalescent plasma as part of an international study of care and protocols for COVID-19. **[PR Newswire]**
- (U) University of Wisconsin – Madison joined the National COVID-19 Convalescent Plasma Project, a [nationwide effort of clinical trials](#) that will treat COVID-19 patients with blood plasma of recovered patients. **[Milwaukee Journal Sentinel]**
- (U) Gov. Evers directed the Department of Natural Resources to [reopen 34 state parks](#) under conditions minimizing overcrowding and maximizing social distancing. **[TMJ4]**
- (U) Car manufacturers, whose sales dropped 45% in April, are planning to [reopen plants in early May](#) with social distancing restrictions. **[NBC News]**
- (U) More than [700 companies and associations have signed](#) the FCC’s “Keep Americans Connected” pledge: for 60 days the companies will not terminate service, will waive late fees, and open Wi-Fi hotspots for public use. **[FCC]**
- (U) The New York Board of Elections [canceled the Democratic Presidential Primary](#) originally scheduled for 23 June. **[New York Times]**
- (U) Quest Diagnostics announced an [antibody test](#) available online with blood draw completed at a Quest laboratory. Experts caution the test does not infer immunity to the coronavirus. **[CNBC]**
- (U) A family dog in North Carolina tested positive for the coronavirus, the [first dog in the U.S.](#) to test positive. The risk of pet-to-human transmission is low, but human-to-pet transmission is possible. **[Fox]**
- (U) The McKelvey School of Engineering at Washington University in St. Louis received [federal funding for a rapid COVID-19 antibody test](#). Researchers hypothesize their test will be 100 times more sensitive than conventional COVID antibody tests, lessening the chance of false negatives. **[Global Biodefense]**
- (U) Argentina [banned all commercial flights](#) until 01 Sept. **[Reuters]**

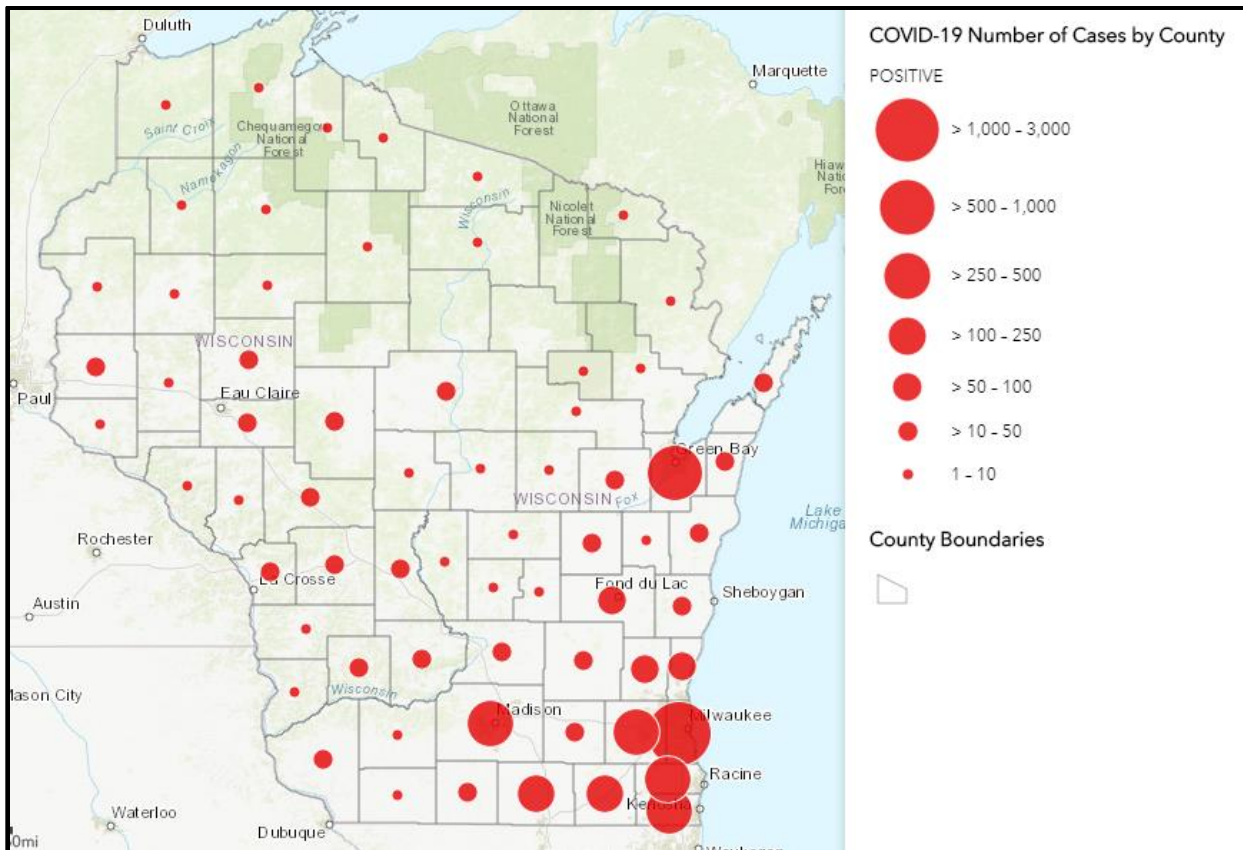
- (U) An [emergency department doctor from New York City](#) is believed to have committed suicide after working at a hospital overwhelmed by coronavirus patients. People must monitor and care for their own and other’s mental health during the pandemic. Working in highly impacted areas could cause psychological distress. **[Business Insider]**
- (U) Federal authorities announced the arrests of two California businessmen who are alleged to have sought to earn millions from the COVID-19 pandemic by [selling masks they did not have](#). **[NBC News]**



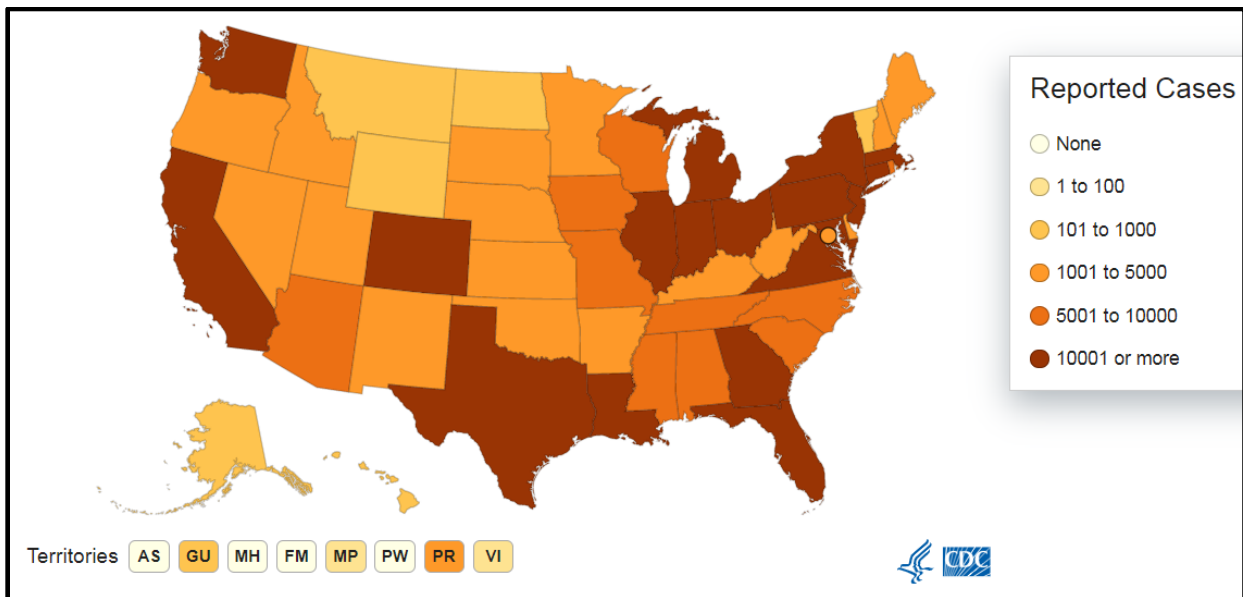
